TOP TIPS FOR TRAVELLING HORSES SAFELY

With showing season fast approaching, now is the time to plan for a safe and stress free journey.

Before travelling make sure that the trailer is in good order and in clean condition. A trailer that travels quietly and smoothly will provide a more comfortable and safe ride for your horse.

Loading is often the most stressful part of travelling. It is important to allow plenty of time so that the process does not feel rushed, and you and your horse both stay as calm as possible. If your horse is young or not used to being loaded, practice loading before you are due to travel.

Protective wear is important to ensure that your horse is safe and comfortable during transportation. Tail bandages and leg protection (either bandages or boots) are important to protect from rubs and scrapes caused by getting trapped under the partition or kicking at the sides. Poll guards are also worth considering to protect your horse from head injuries. As always, it is vital to ensure that the protective wear is well fitting and the horse is comfortable wearing it during travel, to avoid further stress.

Make sure that your horse's management is kept as normal as possible, during travel and whilst away at shows. Avoid sudden changes in diet by using your own hay, and ensure you are carrying plenty of extra hay and water just in case of delays. Allow enough time for regular rest breaks to offer hay and water. Dehydration can trigger health problems such as

colic.

EQUINE ASTHMA

Equine asthma, previously known as COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder) or RAO (recurrent airway obstruction), is one of the most common causes of respiratory disease in horses.

WHAT IS IT?

It is an inflammatory disease caused by an allergy, and is most commonly thought of as a disease of stabled horses, whereby horses can be sensitive to the dusty hay and bedding when housed indoors. However, with summer fast approaching it is important to remember that equine asthma can also manifest itself in horses kept out at pasture, this condition is known as 'summer pasture associated obstructive disorder' (SPAOD), and is likely to be due to a pollen allergy.

SYMPTOMS

Clinical signs of equine asthma include a persistent cough, nostril flaring, increased respiratory rate / effort, as well as exercise intolerance. If you are concerned that your horse may be suffering with a respiratory disease, your vet will be able examine and perform further diagnostic tests to confirm a suspicion of equine asthma.

MANAGEMENT

If your horse is susceptible to SPAOD, the mainstay of management involves environmental control. Affected horses should be restricted from being turned out to pasture at high risk periods. Ideally they should also be kept in a dust-free environment, such as a clean stable with rubber matting, or alternatively replace straw bedding with shavings, sawdust or paper. Thoroughly soaking your horses hay can also be beneficial in the management of equine asthma. Alfalfa hay has been associated with less respiratory problems than grass hay. In some cases, appropriate environmental management may be enough to control the symptoms of SPAOD, however more severely affected horses may also need veterinary treatment in order to manage the horses condition.







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
