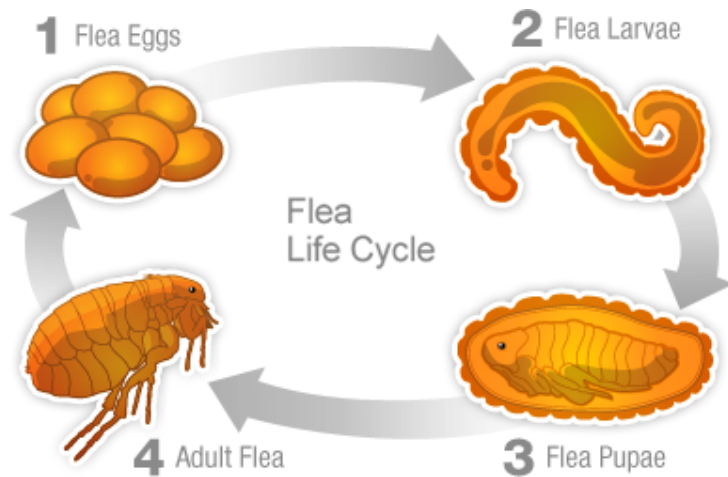


The Flea Lifecycle.

The flea is an ectoparasite, which feeds on the blood of your pet. They can make life for you and your pet very miserable with a vicious cycle of biting and scratching.

There are 4 stages to the flea lifecycle.



The adult Flea

The flea hatches from the pupae in the environment and hops straight onto your pet for a feed. The female will lay eggs within 24-48 hours.

Flea Eggs

Female fleas can lay up to 50 eggs a day after 24 hours of feeding. The eggs will fall off into the environment wherever your pet goes. The eggs hatch in 1-6 days.

Larvae

The eggs hatch into larvae. The larvae will move away from light into dark corners and even under floorboards! The larval stage lasts 5-11 days.

Pupae

The larvae spin into a sticky cocoon to become pupae. Pupae cannot be killed by any house insecticides. The flea may hatch out in 7-14 days but can lay dormant in the environment for months.

Treating Fleas

By the time you see fleas on your pet your house is probably already infested.

- ✓ Treat your pet with a product for fleas every month. It can take 3-4 months before immature fleas in the home are depleted, so you may still see fleas on your pet during this time.
- ✓ Treat your house with a household treatment
- ✓ Regularly Hoover your home to remove some of the flea eggs, larvae and pupae.
- ✓ Wash your pets' bedding above 60 degrees.
- ✓ Continue to allow your pet full access to all areas of the house as normal. That way, new fleas that hatch can jump on your pet and be killed.
