

# CHRISTMAS DANGERS FOR PETS



The festive season is fast approaching and, although this Christmas is likely to be different, there are things that do not change, including the most common Christmas hazards for our pets!

#### **Christmas food**

Sweets, cakes, pies, and biscuits can be particularly dangerous as these often contain xylitol, raisins, sultanas and chocolate, which are toxic to pets.

We also recommend avoiding feeding your pet with leftovers - onions and garlic are also toxic to pets, and our Christmas meals are often too fatty, which can easily upset their tummies.

Please be careful with bones as well, as these can be a choking hazard, cause

constipation, or perforate your pet's intestine if swallowed.

#### **Christmas decorations**

It is wise to keep your pet from chewing on:

• Fairy lights, due to the risk of electrocution

• Ornaments, as these can cause bowel obstructions or contain antifreeze inside

• Toxic plants such as lilies, poinsettia, holly and mistletoe

Keep your pets safe this season and don't hesitate to contact us if you have any concerns!

# WINTER WARNINGS!



Are your pets ready to face the cold? Give our list a read and see what you might still need to prepare:

Keep your pets inside during harsh weather conditions, and keep an eye out for signs of frostbite or skin irritation on their feet due to rock salt after being outside;

Make sure outdoor bunnies have dry and well-insulated hutches with plenty of bedding, appropriate nutrition and their water isn't frozen;

Wild birds have difficulties finding food and other resources during this time of the year. You can give them a hand by providing unfrozen water sources and placing proper feed for them on your yard.

Antifreeze, commonly used during winter for car maintenance, is highly toxic and ingestion can be fatal. Make sure you keep it out of your pets reach in sealed containers and if you suspect they have ingested it, bring them to the vet immediately!

# Christmas hazards for cats

With Christmas just around the corner and the festivities fast approaching, we feel this is the perfect time to remind all cat owners of some dangers this season might bring.

#### Christmas decorations

Climbing the Christmas tree can lead to nasty falls;

Accidental ingestion of tinsel and ribbons may lead to severe gastrointestinal obstructions;

Chewing on fairy lights' cables may cause electrocution.

#### **Toxic dangers**

Snow globe type ornaments usually contain antifreeze, a substance toxic to cats in very small amounts;

Plants such as Poinsettia, amaryllis plant and lilies, and berries from holly and mistletoe are also poisonous;

Christmas food and beverages, including alcohol, chocolate, raisins and grapes are poisonous to cats and so are onions and garlic, commonly used in cooking!

Remember: your cats' curiosity is bound to spark with all the novelty and shine! Keep them safe and enjoy a magical Christmas.


