

Earlier this year, Scarsdale hosted a Clinical Club meeting attended by our veterinary team. The meeting featured representatives from Quality Milk Management Services (QMMS) in Somerset and Neogen, the world's leading genomic testing company with labs in Scotland.

Neogen and QMMS have been collaborating for over four years to study genomic predictions and animal performance in selected UK herds. By integrating Neogen's genomic data with herd performance information, we can better understand how genetics are being expressed on individual farms. During the meeting, our vets reviewed the results of this collaboration.

The TotalVet data management package, which we often use for routine health and fertility monitoring, allows us to analyse this data in both tabular and graphical formats. This independent information helps farmers see correlations between genetic predictions and actual performance.

By visualising genomic trait values contributing to their £PLI baseline, farmers can identify which traits are being expressed well – these are ideal candidates to be used in breeding programmes. Where traits are not being fully expressed, breeding is not the limiting factor and management is likely to be playing a bigger role on cow performance, for example diet, stocking density, housing.

Carefully selected traits can be compiled into a simple Custom Index specifically for improving the herd, aiding in the selection of herd replacements and beef crosses for rearing or sale.

Breeds covered include pure Holstein, Ayrshire, Jersey, Guernsey and Holstein x Friesian (where pure = 87.5% or more). Participating herds need to be doing monthly (ideally) or quarterly milk recording.

We thought the idea of integrating genomic data within our TotalVet database was a really interesting one, and we'd like to hear from any farmers interested in joining a small pilot study. This initiative aims to further develop our approach to integrated genetic selection and herd health management. Participating farmers' genomic data would be incorporated into TotalVet at the practice and could be anonymised for discussion at a future farmer meeting, with permission.

Neogen is generously offering 20 testing kits per farm at half price for participating herds. The selected cows should be in their 2nd lactation or older, ensuring that production, health, and fertility records can be compared with genomic predictions immediately. QMMS will assist in analysing the data and preparing a presentation for a farmer meeting.
